Romania simplifies citizenship regulations

Executive summary

On 11 March 2025, the Romanian government approved a law that aims to reform the acquisition of Romanian citizenship. The amendments will establish new requirements for applicants and modernize the application process, with the goal of improving accessibility and efficiency.

Key developments

Law No. 14/2025 went into effect on 15 March 2025 and introduced the following changes:

- Residency requirements: Previously, applicants were required to have resided in Romania for at least eight years before becoming eligible to acquire Romanian citizenship. Under the new law, applicants may become eligible to apply for citizenship after five years. To qualify for citizenship after five years of residence, applicants must provide proof of their active participation in Romania's economy, relevant educational achievements, or contributions to Romanian culture, human rights, social causes or volunteer work. Additionally, they must meet one of the following criteria:
 - Hold a long-term residence permit in Romania or be married to a Romanian citizen
 - Be a citizen of an EU/EEA Member State or have been born in Romania to parents who were legally residing in the country at that time, while also meeting the general citizenship criteria
 - Have refugee status and demonstrate significant efforts to integrate into Romanian society, particularly through notable achievements in education, professional training or civic involvement

- Implementation of biometric data collection for all applicants: In general, applicants must submit facial images and fingerprints. There are exceptions available for children under 14 and individuals who are physically unable to provide them.
- Transition from paper citizenship certificates to plastic cards: Physical (paper) citizenship certificates will no longer be issued and are being replaced with plastic cards.
- Implementation of language proficiency requirements for certain applicants: Applicants must provide proof of Romanian language skills, demonstrating a minimum proficiency level of B1.
- Launch of an electronic system for citizenship application management: The government expects to launch a new electronic system in June 2026, which is designed to improve transparency and streamline the citizenship application process.

Impact on employers

Employers may inform impacted individuals of the changes in eligibility and application requirements.
