Extension of blanket concession for individuals with pending visa, waiver and appeal applications until 30 September 2025

Executive summary

South Africa's Department of Home Affairs (DHA) recently extended the temporary concession period until 30 September 2025 for eligible foreign nationals whose Long-Term Visa, waiver or appeal applications were pending adjudication as of 28 March 2025.

Background

Since issuing the <u>previous concession</u> on 18 December 2024, the DHA has made significant progress in addressing the backlog. However, many application outcomes will not be available for collection by the previous concession deadline of 31 March 2025, primarily due to delays in the printing process. Additionally, the processing of appeals and certain manual category applications will not be finalized before the current concession expires.

Key developments

The latest extension applies to individuals who submitted Long-Term Visa, waiver or appeal applications on or before 28 March 2025 and did not receive a decision as of that date. These individuals' lawful stay in South Africa is now valid until 30 September 2025, and they may exit and re-enter the country on or before this date without incurring penalties.

Visa-exempt individuals with pending Long-Term Visa or waiver applications must present their application receipt to immigration officials upon departure from and re-entry into South Africa. Those with pending appeal applications must present both their visa rejection letter and the appeal application receipt when entering or exiting the country. Non-visa exempt applicants

with pending Long-Term Visa, appeal or waiver applications who exit the country must obtain a Visitor's Visa prior to reentering South Africa.

The temporary measures outlined above do not apply to permanent residence permit applicants. Individuals awaiting the outcome of their permanent residence permit applications are required to ensure that their temporary residence status in South Africa remains valid during the transition period.

Impact on employers

The extension is expected to benefit employers by minimizing business disruptions in connection with processing delays.
